# Animal Collection Report: April 2014 by Carmen Murach

With a little help from staff, the last of the frozen ice in the giraffe yard was gone on 4-9-14 and the giraffes were able to go outside for the first time this season. These African ungulates are not cold-hardy and must be kept inside if temperatures are below 45° F. The yard is always a bit slippery in the spring, and although the giraffes did engage in some playful galloping, they were cautious. Volunteers monitoring the initial spring outing did not see any serious slipping and/or sliding.

The young domestic goats outgrew their nursery quarters in the Aldabra tortoise building. McKinley, Everest, Kilimanjaro and Rainier are now residing in the Children's Zoo.

The young pronghorn has been battling health problems throughout the winter. An eye and respiratory infection were cleared up with focused veterinary attention but he has recently developed an abscess on the jawline. The abscess appears to be healing well.

The Prairie dog exhibit is undergoing renovation to address a problem with flooding caused by high ground water.



Animals will be off exhibit until the renovation has been completed and the exhibit has had time to dry out thoroughly. We are expecting to add additional prairie dogs to the exhibit this summer.

The Northeastern Wisconsin Zoo's Behavioral Enrichment Program was the focus of the Birthday Party Event held at the zoo on 4-5-14. The event is a very public display of the enrichment efforts designed to enhance animal welfare that are part of the everyday care of the animals. Behavioral enrichment provides animals the opportunity to engage in natural and species appropri-

ate behaviors, and to exercise choice and control in their lives. We strive to ensure behavioral, physical, social, cognitive, and psychological well-being among the zoo animals. The photos below are all from this event.

On a related note: Zookeepers report that the lions were very excited to watch Adventure Park staff training on the Zip Line this month. It looks as if participants brave enough to try the Zip line will have the added adventure of being "hunted" (from afar) by lions!

Senior Zookeeper Jessica Hutjens took time from her personal business in Sioux Falls, SD. to consult with staff at the Great Plains Zoo & Delbridge Museum of Natural History. The Great Plains Zoo has recently opened a new Japanese Macaque exhibit and had contacted us for advice on hand-rearing protocols and other husbandry matters. Jessica has extensive experience with hand-rearing and socializing infant macaques. She was also able to meet with the Red Wolf keepers (our male, Tamaska came to us from the Great Plains Zoo) to share ideas and techniques.

# From the Director: A New Adventure in Brown County

FOR IMMEDIATE RELEASE: April 15, 2014

(Suamico, WI) To mark the upcoming opening of a new attraction at Brown County's NEW Zoo, officials today unveiled a new logo and gave the media a sneak peak of the NEW Zoo and Adventure Park. The Adventure Park, located adjacent to the NEW Zoo on Brown County Reforestation Park land, is slated to open on May 7, 2014. The Adventure Park will feature dual "racing" zip lines, an aerial adventure course and a three-sided climbing tower.

"We are excited to be able to offer a new adventure to our visitors," explained NEW Zoo and Adventure Park Director Neil Anderson. "We've been working on this for the past two years, and it's nice to see it coming together. Finishing touches are being worked on and it will all be done in time for our May 7th grand opening."

The Adventure Park is designed to fit with the surrounding NEW Zoo environment and to appear minimally invasive and naturally appealing. Features include:

Dual "Racing" Zip Lines will provide the participant an exhilarating and extreme experience. The zip Lines are side-by-side, 1000 feet long, half-inch cables that launch from the top of the existing 50' historic fire tower and land on a 12' landing deck near the entrance of the zoo. Speeds can reach up to 35-40 miles an hour.

The Aerial Adventure Course provides participants with 16 different challenging elements. Participants will be clipped into a user-friendly "Smart Snap" safety system at all times while they are off the ground. This allows the participant to be in control of their adventure and "own" their experience.

The Climbing Tower will allow participants to summit a three-sided, 40' climbing structure. On two sides of the structure are climbing walls with contours to allow for variable levels of difficulty. The third side of the structure has a hanging 32'X 8' cargo net.

Adventure Park pricing varies depending upon whether you purchase individual features or buy them as a package. Zoo Pass members receive a discount. (See attached document for pricing and age/weight restrictions.)

In addition to a preview of the Adventure Park features, a new, NEW Zoo & Adventure Park logo was unveiled. It

will be visible soon on billboards which are going up on Highways 41 and 57. In addition, a new, comprehensive map is being developed that not only shows visitors where various NEW Zoo exhibits are located, but also includes the Adventure Park attractions and features of the Brown County Reforestation Camp. "People sometimes don't realize that we offer more than 50 miles of hiking, biking, snowshoeing, and horse trails." explained riding Anderson. "There is so much to see and do right here on our grounds, that we felt it was time to provide a better overview of what is located here."

Brown County Executive Troy Streckenbach shared Anderson's excitement about the new adventure park. "This is great for area residents as well as tourists," he stated. "It is just going to expand the draw of the NEW Zoo. And, personally, I can't wait to try out the zip line!"

Anderson wrapped up the sneak preview event by saying the May 7th grand opening ceremony will be a fun event and feature "a few surprises." He then quickly added, "But you'll have to come to the opening to see what they are."
